The Paradox of Autumnal New Beginnings

Diocesan Lay Conference

The conference was a welcome opportunity to get away from normal activities, refresh and meet some really interesting people. An added bonus was the beautiful sunshine.

The weekend's theme was discipleship, and we explored what it means to be a disciple of Jesus today. Described as a fulltime practical apprenticeship, so not just for Sundays and bible study, we thought about the challenges of serving wherever God has placed us in the world. And whoever He has placed us with: our family, friends and colleagues.

We developed these ideas further in workshops, and at one we discussed daily ethical dilemmas, drawing on personal experiences ranging from workplace bullying through fraud to suicide.

General Synod July '14 Report in Summary

A copy of the report in full may be found on the website.

Monday, 14th July 2014 was a momentous day in the history of the Church of England. It was the day on which the General Synod agreed to women priests being ordained as bishops. There are already a significant number of women bishops in the Anglican Church in other parts of the world and also in other denominations worldwide - but never before could one be ordained in England! An announcement of the first woman bishop in England could come as early as Christmas.

We also debated how we could support the families of members of the Armed Forces living in our parishes; some simplified prayers for use at a Baptismal Service where the family were unfamiliar with church: the relaxation of the robes clergy are expected to wear when leading worship; the provision of housing for retired clergy; and mission the opportunities for churches when the country celebrates the 800th anniversary of the signing of the Magna Carta in June 2015.

Question time was lively! There were numerous questions about same-sex marriage and assisted dying - both very emotive issues. Lois Haslam

Anglican Cursillo

What is Anglican Cursillo? A method of supporting and encouraging our lives as Christians. Cursillo (pronounced "kur-see-yo") is a Spanish word meaning a short course in Christianity.

What can Cursillo offer?

An opportunity to grow in faith. A chance to know the love and grace of God and the joy of Christian fellowship. A way of experiencing Christian community and helping one another in our spiritual journey and in active witness. An opportunity to develop one's gifts of ministry in the Church. It embraces the insights and good teaching of all the traditions of the Anglican Church. It operates within the Church and not outside it, so it works together with groups and organisations within a parish.

Who is it for?

Any baptised member of the Anglican Church (laity or clergy) who is curious, searching, discovering, growing, wanting to be joyful and confident in their faith.

When Irene gave me a leaflet about Cursillo in 2007 I read it and didn't understand what it was all about, but latched onto the words above and felt that I wanted to hing a know more about 'growing in my faith.'

My Story

Lattended a Cursillo weekend.

They run twice a year, beginning on a Thursday evening and ending on the Sunday afternoon.

During



three days we lived, worked and worshiped together, listened to talks given by different people, both lay and ordained, and shared in various social activities. We heard short talks on subjects like Grace, Faith, Study, Sacraments, Ideals, Evangelism, and Christian Community in Action.

There were fifteen talks in all, which led into lively discussions in small groups. In addition, there was Holy Communion each day and a number of chapel meditations. Learning, praying, sharing, singing, laughing and living together is the basis for discovering what it means to say "We are the body of Christ."

The three days are not an end in themselves but very much a beginning. The three-day weekend leads into the fourth day....the rest of our lives.

The impact of a weekend varies with every individual. Some had my experience: I was blown away with the weekend and became more confident in my faith and began to understand a bit more about the faith journey that God had mapped out for me. A friend at church actually said to me after I had attended my weekend, "You have changed."



Some people find that the weekend impacts on them slowly over a number of years; some find it is not for them - but maybe God knows what impact it has had!

Community Poem

I represented Stockport Writers again at this year's Fun Day. Last year, I offered free poetry workshops - and not one person came, to my embarrassment. And puzzlement – am I the only person in Stockport who enjoys writing poetry? As it turned out, I'm not.

This year, I offered to write poems *for* people. I asked for name, age and five random facts, and then cobbled something together in five minutes.



For the first takers I said, *Come* back in ten minutes. More people signed up; I told them to come back at the end of the day to collect their poem. Eventually it was, I'll email it to you tomorrow. And finally, *You'll* have it by the end of next week, I promise. By the end of the day, thirty-nine people wanted poems about themselves!

At the same time as writing the poems, I invited people – at Pam's suggestion – to write a community poem: the theme for the day was joy, so I asked them to name three things that brought them happiness; and to say why.

Roughly forty people completed the form, resulting in a poem three pages long, in fifteen fiveline stanzas. I cut out the answers, sorted them into themes and *voila*! One community poem. And one exhausted poet.
